It is reviewed and updated twice a year (generally in late spring and mid-fall) and may not contain the most up-to-date information. For the most up-to-date information on each program, you must visit the program website. • Nursing programs have additional requirements to apply. These requirements can vary from program to program. Be sure to carefully review the application requirements for any program you want to apply to.

Some additional requirements can include the following (this is not a complete list of all possible requirements). Visit the program website for more detailed information. - Completed Application to the BSN program - Submit an essay

- Submit multiple reference letters Admission Interview may be required

- Proof of current immunization status: Vaccinations must be up-to-date and current.

- A background check performed by the Washington State Patrol and with a "No Record On File" report with the Department of Social and Health Services. (All nursing students are required to complete a background check. The background check is usually completed through the nursing program you are applying to.)
- American Heart Association CPR for the Health Care Provider. This includes adult, child, and infant, under the guidelines of the American Heart Association. Online CPR courses are not accepted. - Students can be required to carry personal health/medical insurance throughout their clinical rotations.

• College-level skills in English and math (eligibility for courses numbered 100 or higher) are required before registering for the the college-level nursing prerequisite coursework if they do not yet qualify to register for these college level courses.

• Schools highlighted in purple are private universities. Course numbers and curriculum most likely vary from that of Common Course Numbering (known as CCN). They may also have additional prerequisites that include religious study. This guide does not list any required religious prerequisites for private schools. If you are considering applying to a nursing program at a private university, it is recommended that you contact the school directly and work closely with them to ensure any prerequisites you take outside of that school count as qualifying prerequisites to apply to their nursing program. **Private University Nursing Program**
